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Healthcare Occupations: Supply & Demand

Among higher education graduates earning their degrees in Lackawanna and Luzerne Counties last year, the largest share were awarded in nursing, which comprised 7.3 percent of all degrees earned, compared to about six percent in business, four percent in accounting, and three percent in liberal arts.


Currently, there are 5,531 registered nurses employed in the Lackawanna-Luzerne County area. This total comprises 33.3 percent of all healthcare practitioners and technical occupations in the region. Over the past ten years, there has been a net decline of 165 registered nurse positions. At the state level, 145,837 registered nurses comprise 35.2 percent of healthcare practitioners and technical occupations. However, like the Lackawanna-Luzerne County area, Pennsylvania is expected to lose more registered nurse positions than it adds in the next year.

In contrast, Lackawanna and Luzerne Counties are expected to create 12 new nurse practitioner positions. Nurse practitioners differ from registered nurses because they are required to have a graduate degree. This degree gives nurse practitioners the ability to diagnose patients and prescribe medicine. In contrast, registered nurse generally provide patient care only.

Despite the contraction of registered nurse positions in Lackawanna and Luzerne Counties, the health care and social assistance industry remains the largest industry in the region with 44,447 employees.

Healthcare Occupations: Supply & Demand (cont.)

In the coming year, Lackawanna and Luzerne Counties are expected to have a total of 973 job openings for health care practitioners and technical occupations. Among these, over 30 percent are expected to be registered nurse positions. This total demand does not reflect new jobs that have been created in the region, but positions that have been vacated.

Despite registered nurses making up the largest share of health care job openings in the two counties, there exists a supply surplus of registered nurses in both counties (108 registered nurses). This means that the number of anticipated graduates from registered nurse programs outpaces projected openings in the two counties. However, it is critical to note that degree programs in the counties serve students from a larger region, so graduates will be seeking to fill jobs across a wider area. Accordingly, continuing to have a pipeline for this in-demand profession is important for the region's health outcomes as well as economic competitiveness.


What's New at The Institute?

Indicators 2023

The 2023 edition of the Northeastern Pennsylvania Regional Indicators event was held on May 3, 2023. For the first time, two sessions were held: a morning presentation in-person at The Woodlands Inn in Wilkes-Barre, and an afternoon virtual session presented in partnership with WVIA Public Media. Both sessions included highlights from this year's report, including critical data on demographics, economics, housing, health and more to serve as a regional report card.

The 2023 edition also expanded on indicators related to arts, culture, and recreation and social equity in response to growing interest to systematically measure the region's progress in these areas. In another first, this year's report expanded to include Wayne County to better reflect the region's interconnectedness.

Labor Market at a Glance

A Quarterly Update on Unemployment & Workforce

Since 2020's significant spike in unemployment due to the COVID-19 pandemic, unemployment has trended steadily downward. The 2022 annual average unemployment rates were 4.7, 5.3, and 5.1 percent in Lackawanna, Luzerne, and Wayne County respectively. Lackawanna and Luzerne's unemployment rates for the year were below the 2019 averages, the last full year of data before the pandemic. This indicates the region remains in a very tight labor market.

The number of adults participating in the labor market is also on the rise. Comparing the first quarter of 2021 and first quarter of 2022, the number of people participating in the labor force (either working or seeking work) rose by 1,451 in Lackawanna County and 2,045 in Luzerne County. However, the number of people employed rose by larger margins: 1,573 and 2,340, respectively, consistent with an unemployment rate that is still trending down. Wayne County saw small decreases in both the labor force and employment during the same time period.



Commuting Patterns Show Interconnectedness of Labor Markets



The latest data on workers' commuting patterns shows the highly interconnected nature of the regional economy. This suggests that economic and workforce development efforts must cross county lines, as labor markets do not stop at these boundaries.

Each table below shows counties that are the place of residence for at least one percent of workers in that county. Only workers' primary jobs are considered.

As of 2020, nearly 60 percent of workers at jobs* in Lackawanna County lived in the County. However, 13 percent reside in Luzerne County and significant shares come from Wayne, Wyoming, and Susquehanna Counties. In Luzerne County, over 60 percent live in the same county in which they work, but eight percent live in Lackawanna with large shares also residing in Schuylkill and Columbia Counties. In Wayne County, 55 percent of jobs are held by workers living in the county.

In total, about four in ten workers at jobs in Lackawanna and Luzerne County are held by someone residing in another county, and this share is higher (45 percent) in Wayne County. Conversely, when looking at each county's resident workers, 40 percent of Lackawanna County residents' primary jobs are in another county. This share is about 38 percent for Luzerne County. In Wayne County, nearly two-thirds of residents' primary jobs are in another county.



Task Force Report Addresses Regional Economic Development

This year's report of the Jobs, Economy, and Economic Development (JEED) Task Force was presented at the Regional Indicators event on May 3. The study is meant to serve as a blueprint for regional economic development by identifying growth opportunities and providing a guide for increasing economic diversity (defined as economic activity spread across a greater variety of industry sectors). The report explores recent data on wages by occupation and industry, to determine how the region compares to state and national benchmarks. It also explores data on the current industry composition and location quotients in the region. These insights support identification of opportunities in targeted industry sectors in Northeastern Pennsylvania, within a context of national and global economic forces.

The top four industries in the Scranton-Wilkes-Barre area are health care and social assistance (45,094 employees), transportation and warehousing (29,799 employees), retail trade (29,559 employees), and manufacturing (29,421 employees). In terms of average annual wages by industry, utilities offer the highest wages in the Scranton-Wilkes-Barre area (\$121,802).

In terms of employment by occupation, a

large share of the area's workers are employed in transportation and material moving occupations (37,729 employees). At the state and national levels, majority shares of workers are employed in office and administrative support occupations (780,937 employees and 19,617,880 employees, respectively).

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In the Scranton-Wilkes-Barre area, the highest paid entry level positions are management occupations, which pay about \$51,800 annually. Similarly, management occupations also pay the most at the state and national levels (\$55,700 and \$49,500, respectively).

In the previous ten years, employment in the Scranton-Wilkes-Barre area has increased by 523 occupations. Transportation and material moving occupations have grown most, with 10,142 positions added. This growth is consistent with the region's geography, as it is home to multiple major highways, such as Interstates 80 and 81, and the Pennsylvania Turnpike.

Location quotient relates to the relative concentration of an industry or occupation in a specific region compared to the national average. A location quotient of 1.00 means that that industry has the same share of total employment in the region as the national average. In the Scranton-Wilkes-Barre area, the industries that surpass the national average location quotients include transportation and warehousing (2.31), utilities (1.64), manufacturing (1.40), health care and social assistance (1.21), and retail trade (1.13).

Task Force Report (cont.)

The Scranton—Wilkes-Barre area' workforce is more equally dispersed among its top four industries than its peer regions, with the exception of Binghamton, New York. Also, unlike its peer regions, the Scranton—Wilkes-Barre workforce encompasses a relatively large number of people in the transportation and warehousing industry (11.5 percent).

At the global level, Russia's war in Ukraine, economic policies aimed at containing high inflation, and supply chains disruptions resulting from lingering COVID-19 effects have negatively impacted current industrial trends. The top industries of the Scranton—Wilkes-Barre area are all likely to be impacted by these trends.

Recommendations

- A greater investment in the renewable energy industry will create an even more resilient economy
- Growth in the accommodation and food services industry expands the region's economic base and results in a significant ripple effect in other sectors.
- Focusing growth on industries already strong in the region allows the area to build upon its competitive advantages



Regional Cost of Living Update

The 2022 Cost of Living Index, published by the Council for Community & Economic Research, compares the region's cost of living at a fixed standard of living to a national benchmark of 100. Lackawanna had a cost of living of 92.9, or just under 93 percent of the nationwide average, and Luzerne's overall index was 91.3. Compared to other metro areas in Pennsylvania, the region had a higher cost of living than Erie but lower than Harrisburg and Allentown.

The region's relatively low cost of living is driven largely by low housing costs, at just 76 and 70 percent of the nationwide average in Lackawanna and Luzerne, respectively. The region also has lower cost of living in health care and miscellaneous goods and services. Groceries and utilities are marginally higher than the national average, while transportation was mixed.
